Good Friday, 29th March at 3pm






Be seated in the Church before 3pm. Maintain the silence.

When the Priest processes in, stand. When the Priest lies on the floor, kneel.



- ◆ Good Friday is a Holy Day of Obligation. It is a mandatory day of fasting and abstinence. This is the day of the crucifixion, the day Jesus died for the sins of the world.
- ◆ The parish altar looks very different on Good Friday: it is plain and bare. There is no consecrated Host in the tabernacle at the main altar of the church; it was carried away on Holy Thursday night to the "altar of repose" to signify Jesus' death.
- ◆ The candle by the tabernacle is blown out, and the tabernacle doors are left open to show that it is empty. Jesus is gone. This is quite dramatic, reminding us that Good Friday is a solemn day of mourning and prayer.
- ◆ The ceremony on Good Friday is not a Mass—it is a communion service using the consecrated hosts from Holy Thursday. Good Friday is the only day of the year on which no Masses are offered.
- ◆ Good Friday services take place at 3 p.m., the hour that Jesus breathed his last on the cross.
- ◆ When you arrive, please respect the sacredness of the day by not talking in the church to anyone. Please show respect and kindness to God and for others who would want to experience a sacred time.
- ◆ At 3pm the priest will begin the service by prostrating himself in front of the altar. You are to kneel during this time. This will all be done in silence.
- ◆ The Veneration of the Cross usually takes place at this service, in which the priest and the faithful kneel before a cross and kiss it.
- ◆ We depart the Church on Good Friday in silence. We do not share salutations. Please maintain the silence in the Church and hold your salutation, greetings and conversations to Easter Sunday.
- ◆ Please stay in the Church and Pray, or go home. Do not congregate outside the doors of the Church to share a conversation. The entire Church needs to be silent. God sleeps, please do not disturb Him.
- You can attend Confession after the Service.

Holy Saturday, 30th March at 10am



Morning Prayer at the Lord's Tomb: at 10 am.

Followed by preparation & decoration of the Church. Confessions until midday.

The Paschal candle represents Christ, the Light of the World.

The pure beeswax of which the candle is made represents the sinless Christ who was formed in the womb of His Mother. The wick signifies His humanity, the flame, His Divine Nature, both soul and body.

Five grains of incense inserted into the candle in the form of a cross recall the aromatic spices with which His Sacred Body was prepared for the tomb, and of the five wounds in His hands, feet, and side.

During the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night the priest or deacon carries the candle in procession into the dark church. A new fire, symbolising our eternal life in Christ, is kindled which lights the candle. The candle, representing Christ himself, is blessed by the priest who then inscribes in it a cross, the first letters and last of the Greek alphabet, (Alpha and Omega `the beginning and the end') and the current year, as he chants the prayers; then affixes the five grains of incense.

- ◆ The Easter Vigil liturgy is the most beautiful liturgy in the Roman Catholic Church. The entire liturgical year culminates in the Easter Vigil.
- ◆ It is the "mother of all vigils" and the "greatest and most noble of all solemnities and it is to be unique in every single Church" On this holy night, the Church keeps watch, celebrating the resurrection of Christ in the sacraments and awaiting his return in glory. It is the turning point of the Triduum, the Passover of the new covenant, which marks Christ's passage from death to life. Therefore, the Easter Vigil does not correspond to the usual Saturday evening Mass and its character is unique.
- ◆ On Saturday 30th March at 5pm in the Parish Garden, a "blazing fire" (rogus ardens) is prepared so that the people may gather around it and experience the flames dispelling the darkness and lighting up the night. Thus does the beauty of the fire, its warmth and its light, draw the liturgical assembly together.
- ◆ Having reached the fire, the celebrant and faithful sign themselves with the sign of the cross. The celebrant blesses the fire. The RCIA Candidate and Elects prepare the Paschal candle incense nails.
- **◆** The vigil is divided into four parts:
- ◆ The Liturgy of Light (Lucernarium): The church is shrouded in darkness as a fire is lighted outside the church and the Easter candle is lit from it. The candle represents Jesus Christ, the light of the world. The deacon or priest processes into the dark church and stops three times, proclaiming "Christ, our Light!" By the time he reaches the sanctuary the entire church is blazing with candles that were lit from the Easter candle. When the Easter candle arrives in the sanctuary, the "Easter Proclamation" (also called the Exsultet, from its first word in Latin, "Rejoice"), an ancient hymn that speaks of the many mysteries of this night is chanted.
- ◆ Liturgy of the Word: A number of readings are read, still in the darkness of the church. From Genesis through the New Testament, God's marvellous plan is unfolded. The readings are often interspersed with chanted passages or hymns.
- ◆ Liturgy of Baptism: This is the liturgy at which all those who have been preparing to join the Church as older adults, are initiated into the Christian community by Baptism and then Confirmation. The water of the baptismal font is blessed in order to prepare for those who will be washed clean from their sins and reborn in the death of Christ. Those present renew their baptismal vows.
- ◆ Liturgy of the Eucharist: The liturgy draws to its culmination and conclusion with the celebration of the holy Eucharist, in which the newly baptised will partake for the first time.

During this Holy night, over 100 signs and symbols will be expressed in all the Rites and Rituals to Praise God for coming to save us. All these peaks with the double Alleluia, ushering a season of great joy for the next 50 days of Easter until Pentecost.


